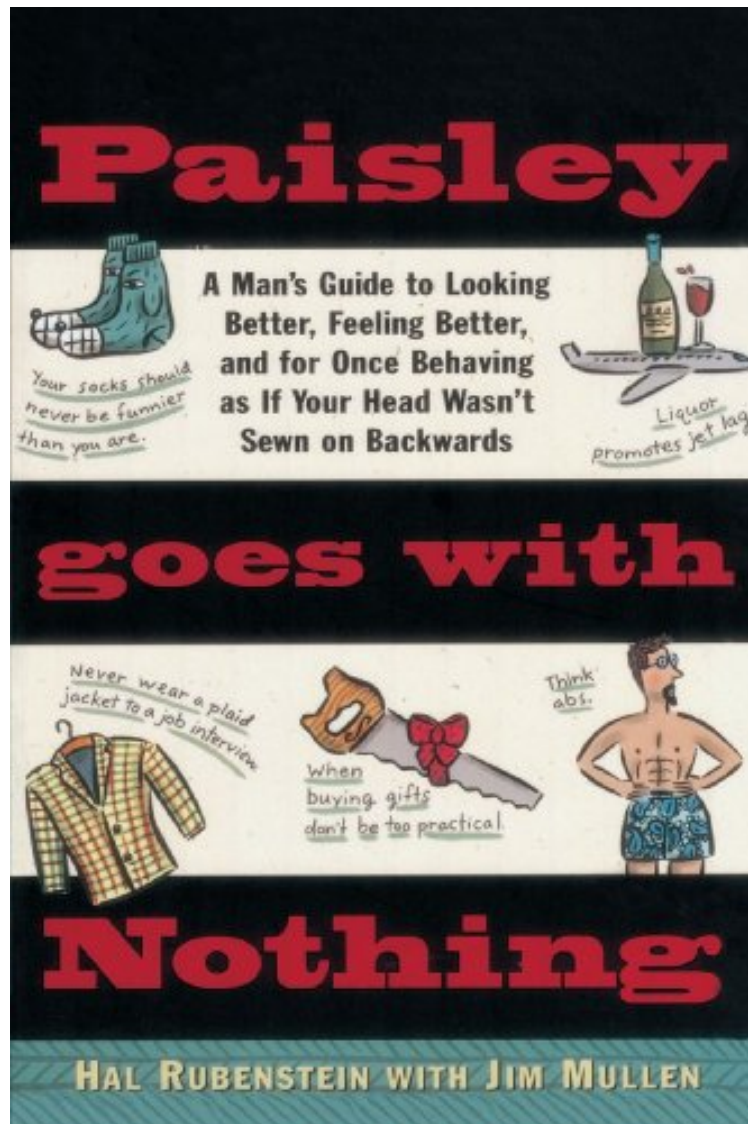

Some of the information is good, some is decent, some is bad, some is wrong, and some is just plain out of place. For instance, there is a brief section on being single and a longer section on travelling; several of the topics seemed out of place in a book about "style". There is good information in this book but unfortunately you have to wade through a lot of chaff to get to the wheat: "10 Musts to Have in the Car -- a detailed map covering a 50-mile radius from your house." The book is also targeted at a slightly older demographic. Of the fifty things that every man must know one of them is, "That Philip Roth, and not Norman Mailer, is the conscience of his generation." Does anyone under 35 care about either of those people?There is certainly enough useful information in this book (and it is mercifully brief) that you should spend a day or two reading it should the opportunity avail itself. Just don't spend any actual money on this book. Check it out from the library.
