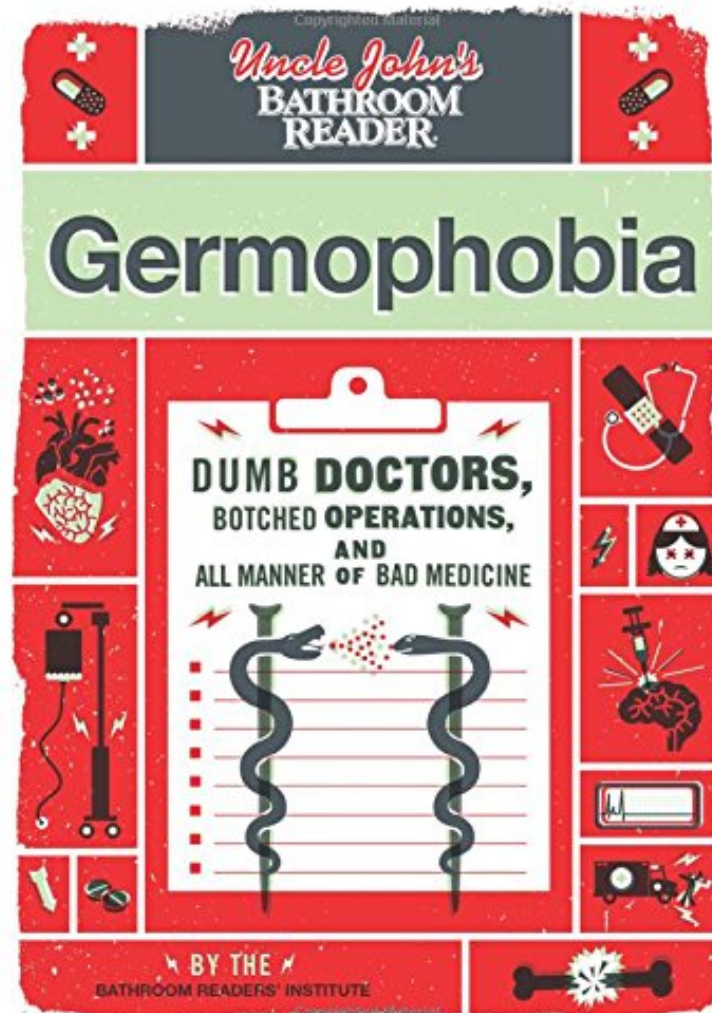

I have noticed that over the years, more and more typos are appearing in Uncle John books. They seem to be getting lazier with proofreading. This book isn't that long, the typos are pretty unacceptable. I have also noticed some inaccuracies, perhaps because I have a medical background, for example, it states the highest blood glucose ever recorded was >26000, I thought that seemed impossible so I looked it up, the highest on record is around 2600. Perhaps another typo, but incorrect information nonetheless. With past BR books I feel I am learning with my
