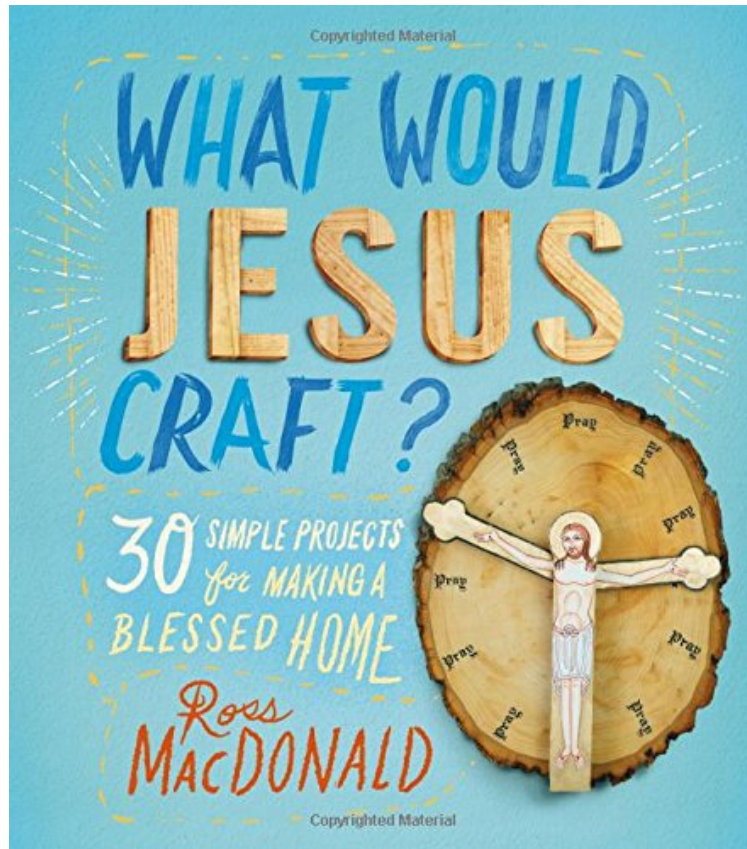

made from a doll is rather endearing, the bundt pan as a caddy screams tacky. Overall, Ross MacDonald seems to mock Christianity. I'm not especially religious, but this book really goes beyond the pale.
