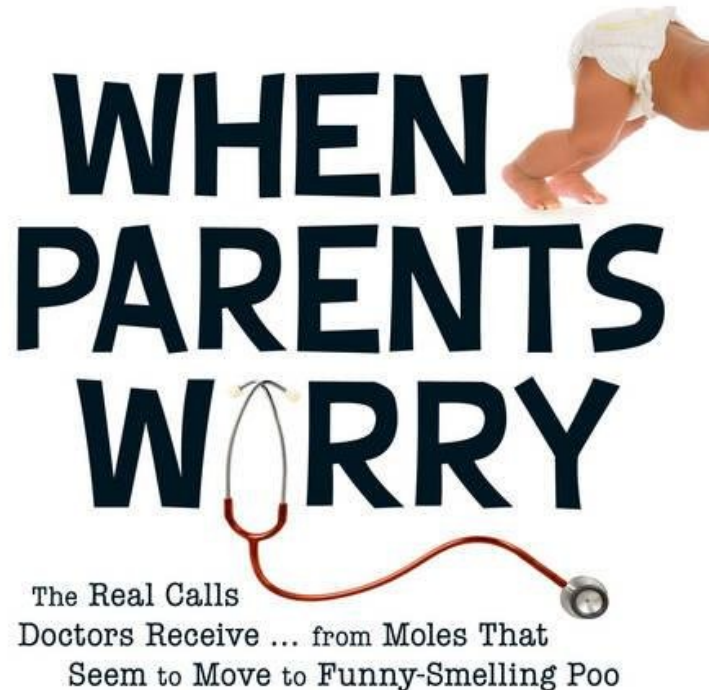

It then dives into 150+ pages of quotes (1-2 per page) that parents of children (infants to teens) have left on an answering machine (I'm assuming). I laughed out loud quite a few times. I look at this book kind of like a quote book like "don't sweat the small stuff" but much more funny. I would think it would be a funny gift for a baby shower, new parent, veteran parents, or even new grandparents. It's not something I would read more than once a year or so and it certainly doesn't take long to get through. However, it's light and funny and might even be something for parents to keep around and pull out when they're having a bad day just so they can read a few and think, "At least that's not me."
